CREDIT UNION CHRISTMAS PAGEANT – BACKGROUND

Each November more than 300,000 people line a 3.3km route in Adelaide, South Australia to watch and cheer the Credit Union Christmas Pageant; the traditional herald to the festive season.

Children across South Australia eagerly await the Pageant, with the magical parade making the streets of Adelaide come alive with the spirit and joy of Christmas, bringing smiles to spectators of all ages.

Regarded as one of the world's greatest Pageants, the Credit Union Christmas Pageant is both an Adelaide institution and an important part of South Australia's event history, with the first ever parade hitting Adelaide streets in 1933.

In 2011, the Credit Union Christmas Pageant is celebrating 79 years, with 'celebrating the clown within' being the integral theme.

The entire South Australian community is invited to "celebrate the clown within" by bringing their biggest smiles, and waves as they prepare to welcome Father Christmas and a myriad of floats, walking sets, bands, dancing groups and, of course, the clowns, when this spectacular procession arrives in Adelaide on Saturday 12 November 2011 starting at 9.30am.

Pageant-goers are also encouraged to get there early and take part in the Guinness World Record attempt, for the largest gathering of people wearing red noses, starting at 9.10am. We will all move behind the blue honour line and be counted by our volunteers. So bring your red noses.

The Credit Union Christmas Pageant is owned and managed by the South Australian Tourism Commission on behalf of the South Australian Government. The naming rights sponsor is the Credit Union Pageant Company, comprising four leading SA credit unions – People's Choice Credit Union, Community CPS Australia, Credit Union SA and Police Credit Union.

In a unique business decision the four competing credit unions began their sponsorship of the annual Christmas Pageant in 1996. In 2011 the four sponsoring credit unions pledged continued support of this iconic South Australian event for another five years.

More than 1000 people who work at or are associated with People's Choice Credit Union, Community CPS Australia, Credit Union SA and Police Credit Union are the people who help make the Pageant what it is, taking on roles such as characters, clowns and fairies and also assisting behind the scenes. Nearly every character in the Pageant, apart from Father Christmas, works at, or is a special friend of these four leading South Australian credit unions.

PAGEANT TRIVIA – DID YOU KNOW?

- The theme for the 2011 event is 'celebrating the clown within'.
- In 2011 the Pageant will be travelling a slightly different route along Flinders Street due to the construction along Grenfell Street, so please be sure to study the route map carefully.
- There are more than 250 clowns in the Pageant.
- The route is 3.3 km long – when Father Christmas enters King William Street from South Terrace, the first set is well past the Magic Cave at David Jones on North Terrace. For about 10 minutes, the Pageant takes over the whole of King William Street from South Terrace to Victoria Square and Flinders Street to North Terrace. The parade starts at South Terrace heading North to Victoria Square where it turns right and heads east on Wakefield Street to Pulteney Street. It then turns left heading north to Flinders Street, before going left again heading west to King William Street. From there it travels north to North Terrace before turning right heading east on North Terrace.
- In 2011, there will be 6 new floats including one mini float. Keep your eye out for them! All the new floats are listed on the pageant program which will be distributed before the event and posted on the pageant website and iPhone App.
- Over 120 talented artists are set to apply make-up to more than 1000 characters between 6.30am and 9am on Pageant Day.
- Allianz Insurance will provide over 1800 breakfasts to Pageant characters and volunteers on Pageant Day.
- It takes 15 trucks to transport costumes, shapes, heads, bikes and props to Pulteney Grammar, the starting point, the day before the Pageant.
- It takes over 240 boxes of tissues and 70 jars of make-up remover to remove characters' make-up each year.
- The first pageant in 1933 had eight floats and four bands. The 2011 Credit Union Christmas Pageant will have 63 floats and 15 bands plus nine walking sets, 10 dance groups, one DJ and three choirs.
- 1200 litres of petrol is used on Pageant Day and 165 batteries are loaned from Exide Batteries to operate the mechanical features and sounds of floats.
- From the week after the Pageant until Christmas Eve, well over 3000 pieces of costume are washed, ironed and placed in plastic bags for storage ready for the next year.
- More than 50 litres of washing liquid, 18 cans of starch, six bottles of bleach and 400 litres of distilled water is used to clean the costumes each year.

- Costume fittings are held over an 8-week period. Costumes are transported to credit union offices during this period. On fitting days, wardrobe staff fit one costume every five minutes.
- Rehearsals for all the characters in the Pageant are held over five weeks in the lead-up to the big day.
- In 2010, the Credit Union Christmas Pageant had 3904 volunteers working hard to ensure that everyone had a fun and happy day.
- In 2010 the Credit Union Christmas pageant broke the Guinness World Record for the Largest Group of Carol Singers.
- The 2011 event will be attempting a Guinness World Record for the largest gathering of people wearing red noses.
- In 2012, the Credit Union Christmas Pageant will celebrate 80 years in South Australia.

PAGEANT HISTORY

- 1905 The 'Magic Cave' – a Christmas fantasy world was established.
- 1933 Father Christmas first appeared in the Pageant and Pageant designers were employed. Ever since, Father Christmas has been delivered by the Pageant to the Magic Cave.
- The Great Depression. The first Christmas Pageant created by Sir Edward Hayward (Mr Bill) featured approximately eight floats, four bands and 200,000 spectators, running for approximately 40 minutes. All participants were staff at John Martins and the Pageant ran from Angas Street to John Martins on Rundle Street. Some of the first costumes were made of crepe paper.
- 1935 The Pageant began acknowledging Australian stories and icons. The Pageant first included a Lord Mayor's Christmas appeal float to raise money and encourage donations for underprivileged children.
- 1938 It was decided that new floats and sets were to be added each year.
- 1939-1940 Pageant Queen first introduced for wartime fundraising.
- 1941-1944 No Christmas Pageant due to World War II.
- 1945 Victory Christmas Pageant – celebrating the end of World War II.
First Radio broadcast, which continued to 1959.
- 1946 Lord Mayor initiates a party for 800 orphans, where Father Christmas could visit them, this became an annual event.
- 1949 The Pageant Queen annual tradition commenced.
- 1949-1959 Sir Edward Hayward selected Pageant Queens.
- 1958 First Blue Honour Line painted on the streets for crowd control.
- 1959 The floats assembled at South Terrace and travelled along King William Street, arriving at the North Terrace entrance to John Martins.
- 1959 Pageant Queen began being selected via store staff in a democratic system.
- 1960 Was the wettest year ever – the Pageant was nearly cancelled!
- 1961 The Prime Minister attended the Pageant: to date, the only time in Pageant history.
- 1969 Crowds grew to 500,000 as television broadcasting and interstate broadcasting became a great influence.
- 1970 16 new floats introduced.

- 1983 The Golden Pageant – 50 years. Just weeks before the Pageant’s anniversary, its creator, Sir Edward Hayward, passed away.
- 1984 State Bank of South Australia entered in partnership with John Martins to present the Pageant.
- 1990 Pageant characters comprised half John Martins and half State Bank staff.
- 1993 The Pageant celebrated its diamond anniversary of 60 years, with 72 sets, 1600 people taking part and a crowd of 400,000.
- 1995 John Martins sold the Pageant to the State Government of South Australia. The Pageant is now owned by Events South Australia (Australian Major Events), a division of the South Australian Tourism Commission and the naming rights sponsors are the four leading South Australian credit unions; People’s Choice Credit Union, Community CPS Australia, Credit Union SA and Police Credit Union, with additional assistance from the Adelaide City Council, David Jones and the many volunteers involved. The credit unions maintain the Pageant Queen tradition, using her and the Princesses to spread the Pageant magic and Christmas cheer to regional areas.
- 2002 The Credit Union Christmas Pageant’s 70th Year.
- 2003 New Pageant manager, Brian Gilbertson is appointed – only the fifth manager since the Pageant began. The first female artist, Jill Halliday, appointed to create a float.
- 2006 Credit Union information sites made their first appearance at the Pageant.
- 2007 The Pageant celebrated 75 years of Pageant magic! 75 tap dancers led the parade.
- 2008 An attempt for the Guinness World Record was made for the largest Mexican wave to celebrate the event’s theme of community.
- 2009 For the first time, a Credit Union Christmas Pageant King and four Princes, joined the Queen and Princesses to spread Pageant magic across South Australia.
- 2010 Credit Union Christmas Pageant free iPhone App and Facebook were launched.
- 2010 Pageant goes break the Guinness World Record for the largest group of Carol Singers
- 2011 Junior royals added to the Credit Union Christmas Pageant Royal Family through a talent competition.

HANDY TIPS – HOW TO MAKE THE MOST OF THE DAY

IT'S THE BIG DAY YOU'VE BEEN WAITING FOR ALL YEAR. HERE ARE SOME HANDY TIPS TO ENSURE YOUR VISIT TO THE CREDIT UNION CHRISTMAS PAGEANT IS A BREEZE!

- Before you make your way to town, study the Pageant route so you know where to go when you arrive.
- Download your free Credit Union Christmas Pageant iPhone App and check out our Facebook page for all of the latest Pageant news.
- Take a list of Pageant floats with you, and count down to the exciting arrival of Father Christmas!
- The Credit Union Sites are also located along the route. Visit them for route and Pageant information, sunscreen, water and assistance with lost children. Write your mobile number on your child's wrist in case they get lost. This will help us/the police find you.
- To get the best spots, you'll need to arrive early. Make sure you bring some drinks and munchies (especially for the children), and locate the nearest public toilets shown on the route map.
- The Blue Honour line is a Pageant tradition, and the key to a successful and safe event. Please make sure that you stay behind the blue line to give our performers plenty of room, and for everyone's safety.
- Make sure the little people get the best seats in the house (right at the kerb), and adults stand at the back.
- If you wish to sit while watching the Credit Union Christmas Pageant, bring rugs, cushions or low chairs (some folding chairs can interfere with other people's view of the Pageant). If you do set up a chair, make sure you leave room for the children – they are the event's biggest fans, and deserve the best view.
- Take lots of water with you: take a cooler bag, or freeze some water bottles the night before.
- Don't forget to apply plenty of sunscreen before you go out in the sun to allow it time to protect your skin, and make sure you re-apply throughout the day. Remember, you can still get burnt even if it is cloudy and overcast.
- If it's warm, wear sensible, light coloured, cool clothing and a hat.
- Make sure you dispose of any litter in the bins provided to keep Adelaide's streets clean and tidy.
- Arrange a meeting spot in case any of your group gets lost, as the city is filled with big crowds of excited people on Pageant Day.
- Enjoy some time in our beautiful city after the event. There are many wonderful places to eat and shop.
- Be one of the first to visit Father Christmas in the Magic Cave in David Jones after the event.
- And most importantly bring your widest smiles, your loudest cheers and your biggest waves to give Father Christmas a warm welcome to Adelaide!

THE CREDIT UNION CHRISTMAS PAGEANT STARS

The stars of the Credit Union Christmas Pageant all have interesting stories to tell: several of the most popular characters have been a part of almost every Pageant in the event's 79-year history. Meet some of the stars who are looking forward to spreading the Pageant magic when the 2011 Credit Union Christmas Pageant winds its way through Adelaide's streets on Saturday, 12 November.

NELLIE

Nellie now accompanies the Bollywood float. Nellie came from England as one of only four mechanical elephants. Having served the pageant for several years and then consistently breaking down, she nearly ended her participation but Ross Hill offered to repair her and she has participated for many years since. She is a crowd favourite and the whole of Adelaide is grateful to the Hill Family for their ongoing support. Nellie has received many offers to make appearances at many events but only comes out for the pageant. Now is that a story made in Hollywood? No, it's a story made in Adelaide.

ROBOT FAMILY CHRISTMAS

The pageant is about tradition, the present and the future. It is for families of all kinds and in some ways this float stretches that point. Here we have a very colourful mum, and dad robot with their two robot children opening a present for Christmas. And what do they get? A human! This is a float by artist David Blight and brings the pageant into the future.

CHRISTMAS BEAT

Bold and beautiful! A huge clown sits on a musical keyboard looking very excited about being the centre of attention in a loud and resonant set of drummers. Credit Union staff go to drumming school to learn stick routines while the Pulteney Grammar school Drum Corp and Heathfield Renegades provide the drumming. This float was designed by Kit Chambers in his return to the pageant after many years as a fine artist. The colours in this float are vibrant and extenuated by the black and white stylistic costumes worn by the drummers and designed like piano keyboards with the black notes shaped like drum sticks. Drum roll please!

MCDOOGAL THE DETECTIVE

With more than 300,000 pageant goers lining the streets and so many children out and about, we need some serious security at the pageant. So who do you call when you want top security? Why you call McDoogal the Scottish security guard who is a real terrier when it comes to making sure things are secure. He seems to have taken a special interest in a serious breach but it has nothing to do with our crowd and everything to do with a cat! I suppose he did not want to be caught "cat napping!"

SWINGING ON A STAR

Now this is star quality with the stars. The Credit Union Christmas pageant is the biggest and the best pageant of its kind in the world and our spruiker on this float is not shy in telling people about it. His friends celebrate the season with the crowd by bouncing beach balls along the pageant route with the crowd participating. Christmas in summer is foreign to our neighbours in the northern hemisphere and this float is a sight to behold for them as they watch the replays with their heaters turned up high. It's holiday time and we are making the most of it with a spring in our step having a ball of fun.

NIPPER AND NIMBLE

Nipper and Nimble are two beautiful, graceful horses with a history that dates to the late 1800s, having been first enjoyed in the original Magic Cave. Both Nipper and Nimble appeared in the first Pageant in 1933. Since then, Nipper and Nimble have become two of the most popular characters in the Credit Union Christmas Pageant, not missing an event since their first appearance. Every year, two lucky little princesses have the opportunity to ride Nipper and Nimble in the Credit Union Christmas Pageant and wave to the crowds of children and adults as the parade makes its way through city streets. It's every little girl's dream to ride Nipper or Nimble and their mums would love to do it if the costumes could fit! Following the Credit Union Christmas Pageant, Nipper and Nimble make their home in the Magic Cave at David Jones, where they have been ridden by hundreds and thousands of South Australian children over the years during their visit to Father Christmas.

FATHER CHRISTMAS

Father Christmas continues his special relationship with South Australia since appearing in the first Pageant in 1933. Father Christmas loves the way South Australian children are so well behaved. He loves to see the smiles on their faces and returns to the Credit Union Christmas Pageant every year. This is one event he would not miss for the world.

Father Christmas stands on a sleigh atop his float in his shiny red suit waving to the crowd, accompanied by his eight majestic reindeer standing at the ready on a specially made ice landing glacier. As the float passes by you can feel the cold. Father Christmas feels very much at home even though the day may be hot.

It is awe inspiring to see Father Christmas escorted in grand style by the Pageant procession to the Magic Cave, an enchanting Christmas wonderland loved by both adults and children alike.

Father Christmas told pageant director Brian Gilbertson "my biggest challenge on Pageant Day is to look into the eyes of every person lining the streets, to let them know that I wish them a happy, loving and peaceful Christmas."

PAGEANT ROYALTY – CREDIT UNION CHRISTMAS PAGEANT QUEEN, KING, PRINCESSES AND PRINCES

The annual crowning of the Credit Union Christmas Pageant Queen is steeped in tradition, having existed for 72 years. The process of selecting a Pageant Queen began in 1939 to help with wartime fundraising. Back then, the Pageant Queen was called a 'Store Queen' as she was chosen from John Martins staff by Sir Edward Hayward, the creator of the Christmas Pageant.

In 2009, the credit unions extended the Pageant Queen tradition by including a King and Princes for the first time in the event's long-running history.

Each year a Pageant Queen and King are selected from a group of nominated Princesses and Princes from the four sponsoring credit unions that best represent the Credit Union Christmas Pageant and the community values of the credit unions.

Once nominated, the eligible royals face up to a public voting for a two-week period and then, taking the public opinion into account, a panel of four judges, including Pageant manager and director Brian Gilbertson, Sunday Mail's Matt Gilbertson, the Credit Union Pageant Company's manager Jodie McDonald, Channel 9's Kate Collins and Mel Grieg from Mix 102.3, selected the 2011 Credit Union Christmas Pageant Queen and King.

The 2011 Credit Union Christmas Pageant Queen and King were crowned on July 21, at a public ceremony in Rundle Mall. This was the official start to the royals reign as the 2011 Credit Union Christmas Pageant Queen and King.

The Royal family name is Australis meaning "Southern" and their family crest is the Southern Cross with the motto "in communitio" meaning communities participating.

The Queen and King represent the four sponsoring credit unions and become the faces of the Pageant for a 12 month reign.

The Pageant Queen and King attend the official Credit Union Christmas Pageant launch in October, credit union functions and go on regional tours visiting schools, special needs centres and libraries. They also make metropolitan visits to nursing homes, special schools and many community functions as well as the Women's and Children's Hospital immediately after the Pageant. On Pageant Day, the Queen and King will travel along the Pageant route in their very own float along with all of the Credit Union Christmas Pageant Princesses and Princes and this year's inaugural junior royals.
